Best festival ever

That's the director's assessment of this year's Taos Shortz Film Festival

t's a wrap. The 2013 Taos Shortz Film Festival concluded with an "awesome party" Sunday night (March 10) at Taos Mesa Brewery to the sounds of Quentin Tarantino's favorite band Spindrift and other high quality acts. Although Tarantino didn't show (though he was invited), the festival brought back a pretty strong hint of another Taos film event from not too long ago.

Shortz founder and director Anna Cosentine was certainly a happy camper as she and her crew were striking the sets Monday (March 11), calling this year's event the "best of all years." That may be more true than ever since she told Tempo that next year Taos Shortz will have attained status among film festivals watched by members of the Academy of Motion Picture Arts and Sciences. That's right: Next year's offerings could have the potential for being selected for a Short Film Oscar.

"Personally, for me, being up there announcing, I would see people who bought Hum Passes and they went to every single program," Cosentine said. "Then, afterwards in the lobby (at the Taos Community Auditorium), people would come up to me and say 'You know, I have never been to this festival though I live in Taos and just decided to go because we read the Tempo.' So, I think we got just a whole new audience, more supporters this year,

and films that were top quality."

A big shot in the arm for local mediamakers was not only the festival's special focus on Taos and New Mexico movies, but the opportunity it posed for creating networking opportunities dropped in their laps. Instead of having to find

industry insiders in Santa Fe or Albuquerque, they came to Taos.

Cosentine said locals "made great connections ... It all went well this year."

Now, work begins on making the 2014 event even better.
